

# 24,000 Working Families are Supported by Government Subsidized Child Care

A review of research found that government subsidized child care increased employment and work hours<sup>2</sup> and another study found that a lack of child care reduced employment (changing work shift/schedule, working fewer hours per week than desired, or being unable to work overtime because of a lack of child care was 21% lower among those receiving subsidized child care).<sup>3</sup>

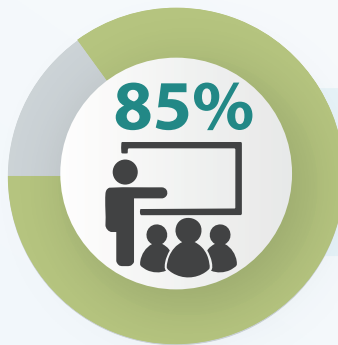
CCRC Parent is a 34-year-old single mother of a school-age child and they were unhoused. Because of the child care support from CCRC she has been able to work for Amazon making \$1,748/month and attend Santa Monica College. Because her child is in a stable child care program she is able to work without worry. She will always be grateful to CCRC for helping her and her child during her darkest hours.
